Faust. Frankenstein. Moreau. Jekyll. The "mad scientist" has been a beloved—and feared—character since the 16th century, and one that clearly appealed to H.P. Lovecraft. Both madness and science were key factors that shaped his personality and literary aesthetic.

From his youth, Lovecraft was an ardent believer in science, and despite his limited formal education his writings displayhis extensive knowledge in a yast range of scientific fields. In particular, he was fascinated by astronomy, the staggering magnitude of cosmic space (and the horrors it may hold) form a backbone which runs throughout his fiction. HPL was unwilling to ascribe the abominations of his fiction to any kind of supernatural cause; rather they are merely byproducts of scientific forces and have evolved to greater size, extent and capabilities than mankind has.

The other side of this coin is madness, a theme which also runs through his liter ary career. It's not entirely surprising that after his father's early death following a psychotic breakdown and a prolonged stay in the Butler Hospital, young Love craft perceived humanity's vulnerability to madness. Many of his tales involve a psyche collapsing beneath the weight of a cosmic revelation, and more than a few of his narrators may be mad to begin with.

Throughout his writings, a descent into madness proves a far more lamentable fate for his heroes than death itself.

We've selected some of our favorite tales of Lovecraft's where science and madness collide—we've even dramatized two of his desser known collaborations with other authors. We hope the journey may inspire your impulse to probe the unknown through experimentation, for therein are the deeper secrets of the universe revealed. But proceed with caution lest you "go mad from the revelation or flee from the deadly light into the peace and safety of a new dark age."
