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Written by HPL's friend and colleague Robert E. Howard, "The Black Stone" might the best Cthulhu Mythos tale not by H. P. Lovecraft. Like Lovecraft, Howard was a self-educated writer for the pulps. Like Lovecraft, Howard's literary creations went on to win substantial popularity after his death, particularly his tales of Conan the Barbarian. While the two never met in person, they greatly respected each other's writing and exchanged voluminous and lively correspondence after encountering each other in the pages of Weird Tales from 1930 until Howard's death in 1936.

REH wrote "The Black Stone" in 1931, and it was first published in *Weird Tales* in November of that year. HPL congratulated Howard on the story, and told other friends that it gave him "a kick", which isn't surprising given that it was a deliberate attempt on Howard's part to mimic HPL's style. Like classic mythos tales by HPL himself, Howard's tale features a forbidding book of occult lore, Unaussprechlichen Kulten, by Friedrich Wilhelm von Junzt. Lovecraft appreciated the creation so much he went on incorporate it in his own stories. The story also prominently features an unnamed "toad god", apparently in allusion to Tsathoggua, the creation of another major Weird Tales writer and Lovecraft circle member, Clark Ashton Smith.

In classically Lovecraftian style, Howard's tale is told by an anonymous narrator. We thought it would be fun to integrate the story with other Dark Adventure Radio Theatre episodes, so we moved Charlie Tower into the spotlight and created a prequel of sorts to our episode The Brotherhood of the Beast, which features both Charlie and his pal the Hungarian spy Kasimir Bartok. We hope listeners will enjoy a new glimpse into their long and strange friendship.

We also drew inspiration from other works that mention Howard's fictional

characters Justin Geoffrey and Alexis Ladeau, such as "The Thing on the Roof" by REH, "The Thing on the Doorstep" by HPL, and "Von Unaussprechlichen Kulten: A Preliminary History" by Steven Marc Harris.

Producing an episode that takes place entirely in Eastern Europe posed new challenges for us — not the least of which was for our American actors to pronounce Hungarian words. We're grateful to our global HPLHS network of very helpful people, who helped us try to capture the sound and feeling of post-war Berlin and Hungary.

Robert E. Howard's horror strikes a slightly different tone than Lovecraft's. It is more primal, visceral and brutal than Lovecraft's stories tend to be. But we also think it's a ripping good yarn and we hope you'll enjoy hearing a new literary voice in this latest Dark Adventure.
