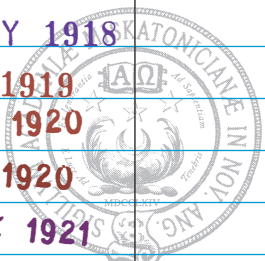

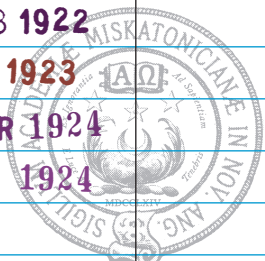

Print on white or buff cardstock.
 Cut apart at solid black crop marks.
 Stamp, hand-write or type due date, name of borrower, and/or other relevant information. Use Adobe Acrobat form fields, if desired. Insert chosen card into library pocket of book.
 Back of card can be a great place for incriminating or revealing notes and doodles.

DO NOT REMOVE FORMS FROM POCKET
Library card owner is responsible for all library material issued on his card.

PREVENT DAMAGE – *A charge is made for damage to this book or the forms in the pocket.*

RETURN BOOKS PROMPTLY – *A fine is charged for each day a book is overdue, including Sundays and holidays.*

REPORT A LOST BOOK AT ONCE – *The charge for a lost book includes the cost of the book plus fines.*

MISKATONIC LIBRARY POCKET

Print on buff or manila paper, if possible. Don't use cardstock.


Score at dashed lines. **Cut out pocket** along solid black outline.

Fold at scored lines and **glue side flap** to back of pocket. Then **glue bottom flap** to back of pocket.

Glue onto inside front cover or onto the flyleaf of the book of your choice.

Hand-write call number/cutter number and book title in spaces indicated. Alternatively, you could type the call number and title on a sticker and attach it in the indicated space.

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- The Dewey system has ten main classes, which are listed below.
- 000 Generalities
- 100 Philosophy and Psychology
- 200 Religion
- 300 Social Science
- 400 Language
- 500 Natural Science and Mathematics
- 600 Technology (Applied Sciences)
- 700 Arts
- 800 Literature
- 900 Geography and History

Special Collections need not use DDC numbers, and every library creates its own system for classification. Feel free to invent your own call number for special or restricted books. For example: *Creation's Doom* by Desiderius Papp **Utopia P218C**

Works of fiction and poetry generally do not get DDC numbers: they are shelved alphabetically by the author's last name. Write "FIC" in the call number space.

MISKATONIC LIBRARY LABELS

Enter call number and/or other info on label(s) using Acrobat form fields. (Or delete default entries and type or write info by hand.)

Print on white paper. Use sticker paper, if possible.

Trim at solid black crop marks.

Glue onto spine of the book of your choice. If spine is too narrow for any of these labels, glue to bottom left front cover of book.

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
